General Manager's Update Year in Review - 2022

2022 was a very busy year for your cooperative. In spite of continuing challenges with extended delivery time on much of our line materials, our Operations Department was able to stay very busy building new services, completing

service upgrades, working on line replacement projects totaling approx. 9 miles, and changing out substation transformers with larger ones at our Conroy, Madison and North English substations. In addition, we have changed out 76 poles (or 1.7%) of the 4,472 poles in our 10-year pole testing & treating program. All the work we completed in 2022 helps to ensure service reliability to you, our member-owners, which is a very important goal at T.I.P. REC.

The cooperative would like to congratulate the group of 2022 T.I.P. REC scholarship winners. Each year our scholarship committee selects scholarship winners and has commented on the outstanding quality of applicants. Last year's group represents another selection of fine young people from our service territory. In 2023, we have added more opportunities for students to receive scholarships. Despite the challenges that we have seen with rising power costs from our power provider, Central Iowa Power Cooperative (CIPCO), rising interest rates, and the increasing costs of material, equipment, and expenses we ended the year financially strong. In addition, the Capital Expenditure Budget for 2023 has been approved by your board. As in past years, the budget focuses on keeping your cooperative financially sound while maintaining the reliability and affordability that our member-owners expect and deserve.

In 2022, T.I.P. REC showed our commitment to the

communities we serve by giving two Revolving Loan Fund loans. The Brooklyn Ruritan Club received a \$40,000 loan to construct an addition on their current building and Holder Holdings, LLC received \$150,000 to construct a self-storage business. Helping rural businesses acquire funding enables our rural communities to thrive.

In August, T.I.P. REC held its first in person Annual Meeting since the COVID pandemic in 2019. New board member, Lisa Tichy, was elected to replace retiring board member, Jim Hines, who had 25 years of dedicated service on the board.

This fall excavating was completed by Shrader Excavating & Grading for the new facility located in the Brooklyn Industrial Park. The dry summer and good fall weather was very beneficial in completing the first phase of the project. Next will be the construction which will begin as soon as the materials are delivered and will continue for much of 2023.

Safety is a high priority at T.I.P. REC. Your cooperative holds monthly employee safety meetings, provides training and reviews safety procedures with our employees annually. A few examples include practicing pole top rescue, basket truck rescue, pole climbing competency, forklift safety, CRP, First Aid and using a fire extinguisher. We also feel it is a high priority to educate children and adults how to use electricity safely. We give electrical safety presentations at area schools and take our Live Line Demo to county fairs in the summer. Everyday our employees practice a work ethic that prioritizes being safe so they can return home to their families at night.

Are Portable Space Heaters Efficient for My Home?



Small space heaters are meant to do exactly as their name says: heat a small space. But unfortunately, many people use portable space heaters to heat their entire home, which can really take a toll on your energy bills. The truth is, whether you should use space heaters really depends on your home's efficiency and energy

needs.

If you're using a space heater to compensate for problems in your home, like inadequate insulation, drafty windows and exterior doors, or an inefficient heating system, space heaters are not a practical solution. Your best bet is to improve the overall efficiency of your home. If you're on a tight budget, caulking and weather stripping around windows and exterior doors is a low-cost, easy way to save energy. Depending on the size of your home, adding insulation can be a great next step. Taking these proactive energy-saving measures rather than relying on space heaters for supplemental warmth can reduce your heating and cooling bills for years to come.

Perhaps your home is energy efficient but you're cold-natured and want a specific room to be cozier than the rest. In this case, a space heater may work for your needs. A good comparison is ceiling fans; we use ceiling fans in the summer to cool people, not rooms. A space heater can be used in a similar way during winter months. Only use a space heater in small spaces that you're

occupying and, if possible, try to shut off other rooms to contain the warmth provided by the space heater. If you decide to use a space heater to heat a small area in your home, make sure the heater is properly sized for the space; most heaters include a general sizing table.

A word about safety: the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates more than 25,000 residential fires are associated with the use of space heaters every year, resulting in more than 300 deaths. If you must use a space heater, purchase a newer model that includes the most current safety features and make sure it carries the Underwriter's Laboratory (UL) label. Choose a thermostatically controlled heater to avoid energy waste and overheating, and place the heater on a level surface away from foot traffic when in use. Always keep children and pets away from space heaters.

Consider alternative ways to stay warm like extra layers of clothing or UL-approved electric blankets. If you have hardwood or tile floors, lay down area rugs to provide additional insulation (and appeal!) and maintain warmth.

We know it's cold out there, but remember in addition to safety concerns, space heaters can greatly increase your energy bills if used improperly.

The Department of Energy rates this project level as medium difficulty, meaning most homeowners can tackle this project on their own.
