

CEO/General Manager's Update



Greetings everyone, we are closing out fall and moving into our winter mindset. The fall weather has been dry, but we have been able to keep our construction and maintenance projects moving forward to ensure our reliability to our member-owners. The weather has also been generous for a timely

harvest which also allows for fall dirt work and planning for the 2025 crop. This year we had many pole rejections from our pole testing crew, but it is better to find the damaged poles now and get them changed out versus letting Mother Nature find them for us later. Out of the 3,806 poles tested this year, we had 202 rejected for wooden damage and decay. Our pole testing and treating program is just one part of our reliability plan that we follow where each one of our twenty-one substations is inspected over a ten-year cycle. This maintenance program helps us to maintain our 99.97%, five-year average of keeping the lights on.

There has been a lot of conversation about defined electric service territory. Defined service territories allow T.I.P. Rural Electric Cooperative to confidently make long-term investments in our infrastructure for reliability and maintaining affordable rates. Because your cooperative has a designated service territory, we can be proactive in our maintenance and vegetation management for the farms, homes, and businesses we provide electric service to every day. Over the last 20-30 years, several states have deregulated their utilities. These deregulated states have a history of having an average electric rate that is 28% higher than traditionally regulated states. On average, electrical outages in Iowa are 22% shorter compared to deregulated midwestern states plus Iowa electrical consumers experience 34% fewer outages.

Our bottom line is providing safe, reliable, and affordable electricity. While we must balance expenses and cover the overhead of business, when we have profitable margins, we give it back to our memberowners. Not only is returning capital credit patronage a major advantage of belonging to T.I.P. Rural Electric Cooperative, it is why being a co-op member matters. Your cooperative's employees and board of directors live and work in the same communities and we take pride in serving you and being part of rural America.

Prevent Holiday Fires

Keep your family safe and your holiday season merry with these fire safety tips:

Candle Safety

Only burn candles where you can keep an eye on them.

Extinguish candles before going to bed, leaving the room or leaving the house.

Use heat-resistant surfaces for candles, placing them • out of reach of children and pets.

Keep candles away from flammable items like trees, decorations, curtains and furniture.

Opt for battery-operated candles near flammable objects.

Christmas Tree Fire Prevention

Choose a fresh tree. Fresh trees have needles that are hard to pull from branches and have a sticky trunk bottom.

Keep the tree away from heat sources such as fireplaces, • space heaters and vents.

Check the water level daily to prevent the tree from drying out.

Place the tree away from high-traffic areas and doorways.

If using an artificial tree, ensure it is labeled as fire-• resistant.

When discarding a real tree, place it far from your home and other combustible objects, as dried trees are highly flammable.

Holiday Lighting Safety

Purchase lights from reputable retailers and ensure they are approved by recognized testing labs like UL or CSA.

• Only use lights designed for outdoor use when hanging outside.

Use circuits equipped with ground fault circuit ٠ interrupters (GFCIs) for outdoor lights.

• Avoid water and snow when using extension cords and outdoor lights.

• Stay at least 10 feet away from power lines while hanging lights.

- Check for broken sockets and frayed wires before use.
- Avoid plugging too many devices into a single outlet. •

• Turn off indoor and outdoor decorations when going to bed or leaving the house.

Fireplace Safety Tips

• Decorate wisely. Avoid hanging flammable decorations like stockings and greenery directly on the mantel.

Perform annual maintenance. Have your chimney and • fireplace checked and cleaned at least once a year.

Use a screen. Install a screen to prevent embers from landing on floors or carpets.

Burn responsibly. Never burn trees, wreaths or • wrapping paper in the fireplace, as they can ignite rapidly and cause flash fires.
